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Celebrate the Birthdays of Benjamin Franklin and Edgar Allan Poe

National Park Service Offers Special Programs in Honor of these Philosophical Philadelphians

Philadelphia – In honor of the January birthdays of gifted authors and editors, Benjamin Franklin and Edgar Allan Poe, the staff of Independence National Historical Park and the Edgar Allan Poe National Historic Site extend an invitation to mark the occasion with these special programs designed for Poe and Franklin fans of all ages.

On **Friday, January 14, at 7 pm, in the Franklin Court Underground Museum**, historical re-enactors Bill Roebling and Paul Campbell will represent Benjamin Franklin and Edgar Allan Poe as hosts for a screening of the 1928 silent film, *The Fall of the House of Usher*, which addresses many themes of Poe's literature and makes reference to other famed Poe stories. Well-known glass harmonist, Carolinn Skyler, will accompany the movie on the glass armonica, the instrument invented by Benjamin Franklin. Following the film National Park Service rangers will lead a discussion and field questions from the audience. A book sale will begin at 6:30 p.m. with literature anthologies, biographies and novelty items from Eastern National, the park's non-profit cooperating association, to support education and interpretive programs. Portions of the event will be filmed for web based education outreach. This program is free and open to the public. A unit of the National Park Service, Independence National Historical Park was created by an Act of Congress on June 28, 1948. Accredited by the American Association of Museums, Independence NHP covers almost 54 acres in Philadelphia's Old City, and includes Independence Hall, the Liberty Bell, Congress Hall, Franklin Court, and other historic buildings associated with the founding of the United States. The Edgar Allan Poe National Historic Site is located at 7th & Spring Garden Streets. Of the several Philadelphia homes Poe lived in this is the only one that survives. During the year Poe lived in the house he published some of his most popular stories including, "The Black Cat." In recognition of Poe's contribution to American literature, The National Park Service protects and preserves his home. The site is open Wednesday to Sunday from 9 AM – 5 PM, closed Monday and Tuesday. On street parking is usually available, or take SEPTA bus routes #43 or 47.
